About the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities (cclu)

cclu is the statewide membership association representing the public policy interests of the chief executives of more than 100 independent (private, not-for-profit) colleges and universities located in New York State.

Founded in 1956 as a 501(c)(3) organization, and incorporated in 1972, cclu enables a wide diversity of campuses to speak with one voice. Its unified approach to ensuring higher education quality, access, diversity, and choice has benefited colleges and students through a host of advancements – many critical to the shape of independent higher education today.

Although not a government agency, cclu is an educational corporation formed under the New York State Regents. Its mission is to develop consensus among a diverse membership and to advance higher education public policy at the state and federal levels. The Commission is the liaison between the New York State Executive Chamber, Legislature, Board of Regents, Commissioner of Education and the State Education Department, the Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC) and other state and federal agencies involved with higher education, the chancellors of the State University (SUNY) and City University (CUNY), and the proprietary sector.

cclu is governed by a Board of Trustees composed of chief executive officers and institutional trustees of member campuses and reflects the diversity of the cclu membership in terms of institutional type, size, and geographic location.

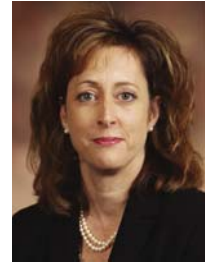

Laura L. Anglin, President

Laura L. Anglin is the seventh president of the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities (cclu), assuming that position in 2009. Most recently, she served as New York State's Budget Director under Governor David A. Paterson, after being appointed to that position in 2008 by Governor Eliot Spitzer. She also served as First Deputy Budget Director in 2007.



Previously, Ms. Anglin served as Deputy Comptroller for the State of New York. Prior to that, she spent several years at the New York State Assembly, starting as a fiscal analyst and reaching the position of Budget Director and First Deputy Fiscal Director for the Assembly Ways and Means Committee under Speaker Sheldon Silver.

During her career, Ms. Anglin also served as an economist with the Department of Environmental Conservation and an econometrician with the Department of Taxation and Finance.

Ms. Anglin has served on many boards and commissions including the Commission on Metropolitan Transportation Authority Financing, the Local Government Assistance Corporation (Vice Chair), the Public Authorities Control Board (Chair), and the Committee on Open Government.

Ms. Anglin received her undergraduate and master's degrees in economics from the State University of New York at Albany.

250 Years of History

New York State has a unique and complementary system of higher education. With the Independent Sector, the State University (SUNY), and the City University (CUNY) systems focusing on different core strengths, the Empire State's colleges and universities serve nearly 1.2 million students annually. Since the early days of the nation, our state and federal governments have recognized the importance of supporting both independent and public colleges and the students they serve. Below is a timeline of selected significant developments:

1754	New York State's first college, King's College, now Columbia University, founded.
1784	The State's early Constitution creates The University of the State of New York as an integrated, comprehensive system of higher education. (All institutions within that "University" were private.)
1862	Under the Morrill Act, New York State chooses Cornell University as its Land Grant institution, awarding one student from each Assembly district a full-tuition scholarship. (Only one other state, Massachusetts, has an independent Land Grant institution, MIT.)
1948	The Temporary Commission on the Need for a State University recommends: (1) creation of the State University of New York (SUNY); (2) expanding the City College of New York to create CUNY; (3) increasing scholarships to broaden access to the Independent Sector.
1956	Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities founded.
1968	The Select Committee on the Future of Private and Independent Higher Education in New York State (Bundy Commission) recommends direct aid to independent colleges based on the number and level of degrees each confers annually. Direct Institutional ("Bundy") Aid program conceived.
1969	Higher Education Opportunity Program (HEOP) initiated.
1974	Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) created; \$1,500 maximum grant.
1986	Collegiate Science and Technology Entry Program (C-STEP) begun.
1988	Liberty Partnerships Programs established.
2000	TAP maximum award increased to \$5,000.
2005	Higher Education Capital Matching Grants Program approved granting \$150 million in state capital support for independent colleges and universities.
2005	Nursing Faculty Scholarship and Loan Forgiveness Program created.
2006	Part-Time Tuition Assistance Program first offered to students at independent colleges.
2007	State Aid Awards for High Needs Nursing Programs at Independent Colleges and Universities established.
2009	New York Higher Education Loan Program (NYHELPS) established.

Legislation

cIcu works with state and federal policymakers to protect and advance programs and legislation that support higher education access and institutional aid. Our principal priorities include the Tuition Assistance Program, Direct Institutional ("Bundy") Aid, the Higher Education Opportunity Program, the Higher Education Capital Matching Grants Program, Pell Grants, and Campus-Based Aid programs, among others.

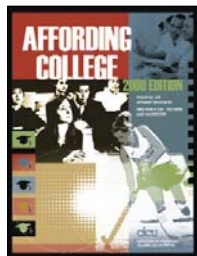

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Collaborative Purchasing

clcu offers voluntary purchasing programs for its members, helping to reduce operating costs in areas from student health to telecommunications and technology.

Research and Planning

clcu's research into trends in enrollment, graduation rates, economic impact, state and federal aid programs, and other topics offers valuable data for decision makers.

Council of Governing Boards

clcu coordinates its advocacy efforts with the Council of Governing Boards (CGB), a statewide association that represents the policy interests of more than 3,000 independent college and university Trustees.

Facts About Independent Colleges and Universities

clcu's 100+ member colleges and universities compose the largest private sector of higher education in the world. Collectively, they:

- Enroll 466,000 students including 297,000 New York State residents. Enrollment at independent colleges and universities grew 18% from 1990 to 2008.
- Award 55% of the baccalaureate degrees, 72% of the master's degrees, and 80% of the doctoral and first professional degrees earned in the state; grant 63% of the bachelor and graduate degrees and enroll 39% of the total student population in New York State saving taxpayers billions of dollars.
- Educate thousands of low- and moderate-income state residents. One in three New Yorkers (27%) enrolled full-time at an independent college comes from a family that earns less than \$40,000 annually; one in nine have a family income below \$20,000 (11%), a percentage that is comparable for SUNY.*
- Serve the most Black and Hispanic students who earn their bachelor's degrees in New York State. Four in 10 Black and Hispanic undergraduate students enroll at four-year independent colleges and universities.
- Contribute \$47.5 billion to the economy, employ 180,000 people, and sponsor more than 500 research centers and institutes that are available to businesses and the community.
- Educate 17 students for the same level of state support it takes to educate one student at SUNY. State support for students at independent colleges and universities is less than \$1,000 per student per year.
- Provide more than \$2.6 billion in financial aid amounting to \$10.28 for every \$1 in Tuition Assistance Program aid.
